2. Medicaid

There is as a vast disparity in reimbursement rates among dental Medicaid providers in Washington state. Currently, Medicaid pays dentists in private practice approximately 25 cents on the dollar for providing care to Medicaid-eligible adults, almost the lowest in the nation. Thus, it becomes increasingly difficult for private practitioners to treat Medicaid-eligible adults when reimbursement rates often do not even cover the cost of treatment.



A. With the state's growing economy and Washington as national model for children's oral health, what would be a reasonable increase to the adult dental Medicaid system?

It should match the median "basic" private market reimbursement rate.

B. What other ideas do you have to solve the issues plaguing the current state dental Medicaid system?

Better coverage for preventative care, which will reduce costs in the long run.

3. Midlevel Providers
