## 2014 COPE Incumbent Candidate Questionnaire

1. On a continuum of public education advocacy, where do you see yourself – supporter, ally, or champion - and how has that translated to action related to early learning, K-12, and postsecondary education?

I definitely see myself as a proven champion. In 2012 I served as President of the Issaquah School Board, and in 2013 I was Assistant Ranking Member on House Education Committee and a member of the Higher Education Committee. I now serve as Ranking Member on House Education and also

represent my caucus on the Quality Education Council, the Article IX Joint Legislative Task Force, the Career Education Opportunities Joint Legislative Task Force, and the Governor's work group on education funding. I've been a significant player for bipartisan negotiations on critical bills like E2SSB 6552 (24-credit grad requirements) and SHB 1450 (consolidation of assessments). I also sponsored HB 2797 this session, which would fund \$700M in all-day kindergarten and early elementary class size reduction facility needs with lottery revenues.

2. Reclaiming the promise is about healthy investments in the public good and the people who provide service to the community. As an affiliate of the AFL-CIO, AFT Washington recognizes the implications of the Local 751 Machinists' working conditions for workers everywhere. We are also very aware of the extent to which tax breaks for corporations result in less funding available for public education. What does Boeing's win of tax breaks and contract concessions mean to you?

Well, we tend to pay much more attention to customers who are free to take their business elsewhere, and the state's no exception. I certainly don't fault Boeing for shopping around to find the best "deal" when it comes to siting future growth, and the B&O tax structure is really set up to easily provide exceptions for businesses that have the mobility that allows them to play states against each other and pick the best economic climate offered. And yes, I expect the same would happen if Microsoft or Amazon had one foot out the door.

However, we ultimately collect 4x more state revenue from these businesses when they stay, even at the lower B&O rates and with some sales tax exemptions...so it's definitely in our best interest to offer these deals and keep all those jobs here. However, it hardly seems fair to those businesses that can't shop around to find a better deal. I've never thought it fair that people pay such a variety of prices for a seat on a plane, but I understand why it happens. The less flexibility you have, the more you're willing to pay.

- 3. For the last six years, the Legislature has suspended the voter-approved cost-of-living-adjustment (COLA) for all K-12 education employees, community and technical college faculty, and technical college classified staff. This past legislative session a bill was introduced to reinstate the COLA, which was unsuccessful, despite proposals and bills from the Governor and leaders in the House and Senate, to fund the COLA through the narrowing or repeal of certain tax exemptions.
  - a. Did you co-sponsor HB 2244 or SB 6235? Why or why not?

No, I believe COLA legislation should be part of a larger compensation reform discussion in the context of the McCleary remedy, and I believe it should happen in a budget year because the cost will be considerable.

b. Given the current political climate of the State Legislature, what are your thoughts on the attempted strategy to fund COLA through the closure of tax exemptions?

I think you framed the question in a way that sets it up for failure. Instead, I would work to ensure the basic education funding formula based on the prototypical school model pays every teacher at fair market value for that school's location, which includes cost of living and other local labor market adjustments. This makes it part of "basic education" instead of a lower priority as determined by the 2002 McGowan decision. Then we leave the taxation debate to the champions of non-education spending.

Remember, the Supreme Court ruled that the Legislature must "amply provide for the education of all Washington children as the State's first and highest priority <u>before any other State programs or operations."</u>

c. If re-elected, what will you do to ensure that these educators and staff receive voter-approved COLAs in the 2015-17 biennium budget?

Yes, but as part of larger compensation reform bill as discussed above. Without those changes, I must abide by the McCleary and McGowan decisions and fund our constitutional paramount duty first.

4. During this election campaign, what issues do you intend to emphasize? What are your top priorities?

- 5. If elected again, briefly describe your key legislative priorities.

My highest priority will be ample state funding of K-12 basic education per the McCleary ruling, including meaningful reforms to ensure performance accountability and improved student outcomes.

6. How will you incorporate education and labor issues into your campaign?

It's absolutely core to my campaign. For example, my kick-off event is being held at Grand Ridge Elementary to emphasize the need for capital investment in classroom space. This elementary school as <a href="https://example.com/over-900-students">over 900 students</a> and has no room for all its half-day Kindergarten classes, much less any full-day programs. Overcrowding is a serious problem throughout the 5<sup>th</sup> LD where enrollment growth is still very high. HB 2797 would have used lottery-backed bonds to fund up to \$700 million in new classroom construction. This passed the House overwhelmingly (90-7), but didn't make it through the Senate, and we need to ensure it moves all the way to the Governor's desk next legislative session.

7. How have you demonstrated effective leadership in building coalitions and support within your own caucus and across the aisle?

Yes. Just ask Rep. Ross Hunter and Rep. Pat Sullivan about how they felel about me taking the reigns as top House Republican for education. In fact, Ross gave me a quote to use in my campaign, saying "He's a smart guy, he understands education, and he cares about kids." We had lunch just last week.
